Ascent Pan-London Floating Support service	<p>This service is being run in addition to and alongside existing local services, to supplement and support the current DA service provision. Angelou Project	<p>The Angelou Project consists of 10 support services for females experiencing domestic or sexual violence, living in K&C, H&F and Westminster. Clare's Law Application	<p>Clare's Law is a scheme that allows the police to share information about a person's previous history of violence or abuse in order to protect individuals at risk and prevent further crime.</p> <p>You can apply to the police for disclosure of information about a current or ex-partner where you are concerned about risk. Common-law powers are used to share relevant information about an individual's history of domestic abuse where necessary, lawful and proportionate to protect a potential victim.</p> <p>A third-party applicant may request information about an individual where they are concerned about the risk posed to another person; however, any disclosure will only be made where lawful, necessary and proportionate, and to the person best placed to safeguard the potential victim – this will normally be the person at risk.</p>	<p>You can apply for your Clare's Law disclosure at Request information under Clare's Law: Make a Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme (DVDS) application Metropolitan Police</p> <p>Support workers can also apply on behalf of the individual at the above link.</p> <p>Once the application has been received, the police will research the parties and if there is something to disclose they will arrange a face to face meeting with the person who is potentially at risk to disclose the information. When initial contact is made with the individual, they will be asked to complete a risk assessment with the police officer. During the process, the officer will offer safeguarding options.</p>
Emergency overnight provision	<p>The Westminster women's safe space (WWSS) offers temporary respite rooms for females currently rough sleeping or those who are at risk of rough sleeping and who are also currently experiencing or who are at risk of experiencing domestic abuse/violence against women and girls. All support needs are considered and the rooms are available for up to 3 months. Pets are also considered on a case by case basis. Referrals must be from Westminster based services only and priority will be given to Westminster rough sleeping teams. We will consider referrals for those who are chain verified as well those who are not.</p> <p>There are 28 respite rooms located across the ground, 1st, 2nd and 3rd floors of the WWSS. Each of these rooms consist of a bedroom and an on suite bathroom. There are shared kitchen and laundry facilities in each of the clusters of either 3 or 5 rooms. 5 of the respite rooms are</p>	<p>Referrals must be from Westminster-based services only and priority will be given to Westminster rough sleeping teams. 	for women who have no recourse to public funds. Meals are not provided however, food vouchers will be provided for those with no recourse to public funds. The assessment and reconnection workers at WWSS will case work all clients who are accessing these respite rooms carrying out a full assessment. The assessment and reconnection workers will continue to work with referral agents and link clients in with all relevant services for ongoing support based on their needs at any given time. All those apart from residents with no recourse to public funds will need to make a housing benefit claim.

	<p>2. The Drive Project works with high-risk domestic abuse perpetrators to stop harmful behaviour and protect victims. Through 1:1 case management and a police-led multi-agency approach, it challenges perpetrators to change while addressing issues like mental health, substance use, and housing. Victims receive parallel support from IDVAs to ensure safety and coordinated working.</p>	<p>2. Referrals to the pan-London Drive project usually come through local risk forums like MARAC or DAPP. These panels coordinate safety planning and may refer cases to Drive for 1:1 case management, disruption tactics, or other relevant offender interventions, though this isn't guaranteed.</p>
<p>Survivors Gateway</p>	<p>Survivors Gateway is a referral service for anyone over the age of 13 that has experienced sexual violence (sex they haven't consented to). Once referred to the service, Survivors Gateway will refer you to the local service that can help. The Survivors Gateway is only able to accept a set amount of referrals each week, so may close the referral process if the set amount has been reached. <p>Survivors UK</p>	<p>SurvivorsUK offer a pan-London service to any male over the age of 18 who has experienced sexual abuse and/or raped whether in adulthood or childhood.</p> <p>SurvivorsUK can offer a range of support services including access to an independent sexual violence advisor (ISVA) service, counselling appointments as well as web and SMS chat. 	<p>1-2-1 Advice Casework: Our caseworkers work with survivors to explore support options as well as advocating to statutory services such as housing, social services, health services, school/university and the police. They can attend key meetings, appointments and court hearings with survivors, or support survivors to report the abuse if they wish to. <p>Women’s Trust Counselling Service</p>	<p>Open to all women who are, or have been, affected by domestic abuse.
